'Working for the Lord'-Colossians 3: 18-24.

When someone asks who do you work for, how do you respond? If employed by a company, you would likely provide the name of your employer. Our text today, however, teaches that we really should go about our jobs understanding that we ultimately are working for the Lord.

A few years ago, a style of preaching known as 'prosperity' became popular. do should be done as if we are working for the Lord.

While we work FOR the Lord, we work WITH people and as a result, we must learn to live in harmony with one another in our roles as wives, husbands, children and workers. We all have many bosses but there is but one Lord, Jesus. He deserves our best and he deserves our all.

Christians are to be workers and not whiners. We should 'work to live' and not 'live to work'. Our working and living must

The problem with it is that it promoted people to focus on what God could do for them but not what they could do for God. Rest assured that God knows his role as our provider, we, however, need to know our role as servants.
